**Using AI to Prepare and Review Grant Applications**

**Summary:** Funders may use AI to perform administrative functions like checking completeness, sorting content, etc., to save time as initial steps in the application review process. Policies are under development with consideration for possible risks and harm.

Federal Government

On April 23, 2025, The Office of Management and Budget issued a memo to all heads of executive departments and agencies titled: [Accelerating Federal Use of IA through Innovation, Governance and Public Trust](#) which outlines guidance for implementing Executive Order (E.O.) 14179, Removing Barriers to American Leadership in Artificial Intelligence, signed by President Trump on January 23, 2025.

OMB Memorandum M-25-21d **does not specifically address** whether agencies are currently using AI to review grant applications. However:

- The memo encourages agencies to adopt AI broadly to "provide improved services to the public" and "increase government efficiency"
- Agencies are directed to develop AI strategies and inventory all AI use cases
- The memo **does not prohibit** using AI for grant review.

Federal agencies must disclose they use AI to review applications under certain conditions:

1. **AI Use Case Inventory (Annual):** All agencies (except DoD and Intelligence Community) must publicly post an annual inventory of their AI use cases on their websites. This would include AI used for grant review.
2. **If AI is "High-Impact":** Grant application review could potentially qualify as "high-impact AI" if the AI output serves as a principal basis for decisions affecting:
  - Access to critical government resources or services
  - Significant effects on rights or access to programs
3. **For High-Impact AI, agencies must:**
  - Complete an AI Impact Assessment
  - Publicly report determinations and waivers
  - Provide options for end users and the public to submit feedback
  - Ensure affected individuals have access to human review and appeals

**Conclusion:** If a federal agency uses AI to review grant applications, it would likely need to disclose this in its public AI inventory, and depending on how significantly the AI influences decisions, may need to provide additional transparency and appeal mechanisms.

**Tip:** Check the federal agency's website and complete preparatory research.
